Doug McLemore

Congratulations Doug McLemore, on 25 years of service at Pelican Park!

When did you first start working at Pelican Park and what was your job title? On June 7, 1998 as a Park Foreman

What are your responsibilities today? Prepare and implement annual budget, write bids and spec them out for purchases, manage two Supervisors, two Foreman and 20 employees, interview potential employees, hire, discipline, perform annual evaluations, oversee staff safety training, write procedures, maintain sewer and water license for the parks sewer and water systems, oversee the rebuilding of fields, construction of new facilities, as well as repairs of existing facilities, oversee the Turf department and help assess and make recommendations for repairing damaged fields, and eradicating insects and fungus outbreaks.

How would you describe the culture at Pelican Park? Goal oriented! We are a TEAM and my staff has to perform rigorous tasks in the heat, cold, rain and shine. They understand that although their job is extremely demanding their TEAMWORK is the reason this park exists for the adults and children that use these facilities.

How do you maintain the majority of the staff as long as you do? I believe the main reason for longevity is that our employees see the benefits just as I did, as the park provides benefits rarely seen anymore, such as health insurance, sick leave, vacation, uniforms and especially a pension, as a wonderful thing to look forward to at retirement.

What motivates you? I was raised by a single mother and we never had much, so I learned at an early age (12) that one must work to meet the basics of life. I saw my mother work long hours on her feet as a Beautician (hair stylist these days) to provide for her family and I always admired her strength and family focus. This was what motivated me to be a good provider for my family and to pass that example on to my children and grandchildren.

What is your proudest moment at Pelican Park? I actually have two, being promoted to Assistant Director and making 25 years at the park are two moments that I will always hold on to.

How do you see Pelican Park in the near and far future? I have watched this park grow from one gym, four baseball fields, and four soccer fields to what is today. I can say that the vision of this Board of Directors and our Executive Director is one filled with wonderful things for the patrons of Recreation District #1. The commitment the tax payers have made to this facility and the trust they have placed in our Board is going to yield wonderful facilities to not just sports, but all types of recreational activities for young and old alike. I see this park as being the CROWN JEWEL of Louisiana!

What are your hobbies? Golfing, writing and playing music, boating, deer hunting, and socializing through Mardi Gras clubs.

Gold Upgrades

The Park recently installed four new 24' L x 24' W x 14' H shade structures that have been added at the Gold fields complex. Underneath the shade structures are four brand new 19' x 19' x 8 row aluminum bleachers with aisles and handrails as well as side and rear rails. Each set of bleaches can seat (83) people. There are two set for Gold field #1 and two sets for Gold field #2. These bleachers were purchased by the Park by monies that were received from FEMA after Hurricane Ida destroyed the original bleachers.

Summer Fun at the Park! Environmental Education



Our Nature Explorers Camp was back in full swing at the park this summer for its second year! Focused on environmental education, it was attended by 159 campers ages 6-12 for six fun-filled weeks. It was indeed fun, but it also kept the kids constantly active and engaged, learning important things about the natural world they live in.

Weekly themes this year included "Soil Detectives," "Signs in Nature," "The B's of Louisiana," "Swamp Critters," "The Wonders of Water," and "Secret World of Plants. This environmentally based program was planned and coordinated by our great camp co-directors, Jan Mistich and Eva Sanford. Jan brought her vast knowledge of environmental education and 30+ years' experience as a science teacher to our campers. Jan wrote the entire curriculum for camp this year and taught daily lessons. 
























Louisiana Iris Conservation Initiative (LICI) Update

There have been about 1000 irises planted over the last year in Pelican Park by the Louisiana Iris Conservation Initiative (LICI). They have been planted in the back of the park, in the drainage area near Silver and in a bog area nearby.

After inspection by Gary Salathe, Founder of LICI, in early August, he reported that the irises look great and are multiplying. New offshoots are beginning to show, meaning the irises will likely double in number by next spring. This time of year, the irises are cut down to about 8" high to control the weed competition, so don't be concerned if you see the park crew cutting the bog. It will help when the irises start growing in September. The grass cuttings also help build up the soil as

LICI will have more irises available for both locations this fall/ winter to plant. Combined with the natural growth of the irises already planted, next spring, the irises will put on quite the show when they bloom. (You may have noticed that the bloom this past April was muted because the late March freeze we experienced killed about 60% of the flower buds.)

The yellowing on the leaves is natural when they go dormant for the summer, as they are now.

LICI is a Louisiana non-profit formed by individuals interested in preserving and restoring the Louisiana iris in habitats where it once grew in abundance. The group relocates wild, native irises threatened with destruction to area refuges and nature preserves, typically in locations where they can be viewed by the public when they bloom.

Purple Martins are a **Beautiful Addition to Our Pelican Park Wildlife**

Purple martins once relied on natural tree cavities, but now are raised in manmade housing, such as the 24-unit gourd system that was installed at Pelican Park in the Spring of 2022. The staff were excited to have just completed our second successful season and watch their population grow.

If you are not familiar with these intriguing birds, Purple Martins are the largest of the swallow family, and pass through this area twice a year on their great migratory adventure, a flight for some that can be 8,500 miles. Wintering in South America, they begin their journey northward right around the first of the year. They usually arrive along the Gulf Coast from late January to early February. In addition to their beautiful song and graceful flight, they also help

humans by consuming thousands of tons of flying insects per year – definitely a great asset for Pelican Park!

The adult males have beautiful iridescent purple feathers covering their entire body. Female Purple Martins are duller in color with grey on their head, chest and lower belly.

Purple Martins nest from late March to early July. Female martins typically lay 3-5 eggs, which hatch in about 14 days. This season, we had two full nests, the first with four eggs and the second with five eggs. By mid-May, we eagerly watched and waited for them to hatch.

Once they hatched in mid-June, Eric Baka with Wildlife and Fisheries and his team came and banded our birds! Bird banding is a process of placing a small, lightweight ring around a bird's leg. These rings can be made of plastic or metal and each is coded with a unique number or code. These codes are then used to precisely distinguish one bird from another. Bird banding is a federally regulated process according to the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, 50 CFR 21. This requires a federal bird banding permit, as well as permits from states and provinces to legally band any migratory bird.

One silver band (federal) and a second band, which is a unique identifier for birds banned at Pelican Park. Going forward, all Purple Martins banded at the Park will have this unique band as well as the silver federal band. By the first week of June, they began to fledge and prepare for flying in the following 28 days.

In early August, the Martins leave the colony to start assembling larger flocks. This is called a roost. The southward migration begins in early August and virtually all Purple Martins leave the Gulf Coast by Mid-September.



What is a Martin Roost? In late Summer, after leaving the nesting colony, Purple Martins gather in large flocks to feed, socialize and rest before migrating. This activity, known as pre-migratory roosting, can attract thousands of birds to one small area. Martins also form winter roosts on their South American wintering grounds where they will often flock together with other martin species.

Purple Martins come back to the same nesting site year after year, so the Pelican Park colony will continue to grow. Until they leave for southward migration, they can be seen all around the Park, but especially around the Silver fields on the gourd system and the surrounding light poles! By mid-September, the gourd system will be taken down and stored for the winter and will be put back up again in early spring, waiting for our birds to return and new ones to start
